

DIY Round Side Table Plans

This round end table is inspired by McGee & Co's Cora Side Table. You can easily recreate the look of this high end table for a fraction of the price! 


Step 1: Dimension all of your boards according to the cut list above.




Step 2:

- Create the "metal" rod using the wooden dowels (parts F). Find details on how to do this in this post about <u>how to make wood</u> <u>look like black metal</u>.
- Drill ¹/₂" holes in the legs (parts A) 4" from the bottom and insert the dowels (parts F) in the holes. Use wood glue to reinforce.






Step 3: Using wood glue and pocket holes, attach the top stretcher (part B) to the legs.






Step 4: Using wood glue and pocket holes, attach the small stretchers (part C) to the longer stretcher (part B) and to the remaining legs (parts A).




Step 5: Make the Round Table Top

Glue parts D to each other. Optional: reinforce with pocket holes






Using the <u>CircleGuideKit from Milescraft</u>, use your router to cut the circle out of the wood (parts D) for the tabletop.





Step 6: Attach the round tabletop to the base from the bottom using wood screws.



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
